

# Records

Some items included in the 1935 Time Capsule are official records, retained because of their significance at the time of internment. These are City of Taylor records.

## Artesian Wells

The presence of water is key to any pioneer or farmer. In addition to the San Gabriel River, Williamson County has an abundance of streams, springs and artesian wells. Some of the older properties in Taylor still have their own well or spring today.

One of the main sources of early city water came from an artesian well in what is now Murphy Park. The water from this artesian well came out hot and sulfurous. Some of the historical pictures of this well show that it is being aerated because of the high temperature of the water. This water was eventually piped off into a processing plant and then moved down lines to businesses and homes. The City of Taylor has always had a plentiful water supply, allowing it to grow into a major hub in the county.



Included in the time capsule was the Well Log for Artesian Well No. 2, located in the City Park, drilled by Lanning & Coffield, Inc. Spudded (drilling began) July 20th, 1934; completed September 3rd, 1934. This report lists all the layers of soil and rock penetrated during drilling.

# Taylor City Limits

Another City of Taylor document of some importance was the legal boundaries of the city limits. Rather than producing a map, the boundary was described in great detail, with specific streets and properties listed. This described boundary comprised a legal document and was used as an official notice for an election on November 30<sup>th</sup>, 1925 to declare the Taylor city limits.

This was in an envelope labeled: "Present City Limits, May 1935, given by T.W. Falkenberg."

## An Ordinance Calling and Ordering an Election to be Held Within the City of Taylor, Texas, on the 30th Day of November, A. D. 1925, Submitting to the Qualified Voters of Said City the Proposition as to Whether or not Section 2 of Article "1" of the Now Existing Charter of the Said City of Taylor, Texas, Shall be so Amended as to Increase and Extend the Boundaries and Limits of the Said City of Taylor, Texas, and Appointing Officers to Hold Said Election.

WHEREAS, The Board of Commissioners of the City of Taylor, Texas, deems it advisable to submit to the qualified voters of said City of Taylor, Texas, the heretofore proposed amendment to the now existing charter of said City;

AND WHEREAS, THE SAID BOARD of Commissioners of the said City of Taylor, by publication for more than twenty days preceding the dates of the first, second and third and final passage of this ordinance in the Taylor Daily Press, a newspaper published in said City of Taylor, Texas, gave notice to the said qualified voters of said city of its intention at said times to call and order such election so submitting said proposed amendment to said now existing charter of said city;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF TAYLOR: That an election be and is hereby ordered by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Taylor, Texas, to be held in the City of Taylor, Texas, on the 30th day of November, A. D. 1925 at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

First, Shall section 2 of Article "1" of the now existing charter of the City of Taylor, Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 2. Boundaries—The boundaries and limits of the City of Taylor, until changed as hereinafter provided, shall be as follows:

Beginning at a stake situated one mile S. 4 1/2 E. from the center of Block No. 22, known as the public square, thence N. 85 1/2 E. to a stake for corner on the East boundary line of the right of way of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railroad Company of Texas; thence in a Northerly direction with said right of way line to a point in the center of Mustang Creek for corner; thence down the channel of said creek with its meanders to a point in said creek which is 15 feet S. 46 1/2 W. from an Elm tree 16 inches in diameter; thence N. 46 1/2 E. 208 feet to an Elm tree 8 inches in diameter for corner; thence N. 15 W. 723 feet to a cedar post for corner in the South margin of the Taylor and Lexington road; thence S. 85 E. 170 feet to corner on the South margin of said road; thence N. 19 1/2 W. 1463 feet to corner; thence N. 85 1/2 E. with the North margin of the old Taylor and Thorndale road 470 feet to the S. E. corner of Lot No. 23 in the Alexander's Addition to the City of Taylor; thence N. 43 W. 147 feet; thence N. 85 1/2 E. 50 feet to corner; thence N. 43 W. 175 feet to the N. E. corner of said Alexander's Addition to the City of Taylor; thence S. 85 1/2 W. to the S. E. corner of a tract of ten acres subdivided by Thomas Duffy; thence N. 19 1/2 W. with the East line of said ten acres 1185.3 feet to the N. E. corner of said ten acres; thence S. 71 W. 46 feet to piece of iron pipe for corner; thence N. 19 W. at 40 feet pass the S. E. corner of Taylor City Cemetery at 2838 feet to corner on the South margin of a public road called Thorndale Street; thence S. 71 W. 246 feet to corner on the East right of way line of said Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railroad Company of Texas; thence in a Northerly direction with said right of way to the South margin of a public road on the South line of the John Pharrass Survey; thence S. 71 W. with the South margin of said road, passing the S. W. corner of said John Pharrass Survey and the S. E. corner of the W. J. Baker Survey and continuing S. 71 W. with the South margin of said road to the N. W. corner of what is now the Taylor City Park and also known as the Dan Murphy tract at 2838 feet to Davis Street; thence N. 19 W. at 50 feet intersect the North margin of said road at 1290 feet, a stake for corner; thence S. 71 W. 868 feet to a stake for corner on the West line of said Walter Gilmore tract and the East line of a tract owned by Joe Stanny; thence S. 19 E. 181 feet to stake for corner; thence S. 71 W. 1342 feet across said Joe Stanny tract to corner on the East margin of a public road; thence N. 19 W. 847 feet to corner; thence S. 71 W. 50 feet to the N. E. corner of Schroeder's lot at 517 feet in all to said Schroeder's N. W. corner on the East line of old Fair Ground tract; thence S. 19 E. 847 feet to S. E. corner of said old Fair Ground tract; thence S. 71 W. following the South line of said Fair Ground and continuing in all 1625 1/2 feet to a cedar post in a fence on the North margin of the Street for corner; thence S. 19 E. at 1082 feet intersect D. P. Smith's fence on the South margin of the Georgetown road at a point 200 feet S. 71 W. from his N. E. corner at 2418 feet in all a stake for corner; thence S. 3 1/4 W. 2496 feet a stake for corner on the North line of the T. G. N. Railroad Company right of way line; thence N. 87 1/2 E. with said right of way line 1417 1/2 feet to corner on the original West line of the City of Taylor; thence with said line S. 4 1/2 E. 4147 1/2 feet to the S. W. corner of said City of Taylor; thence N. 85 1/2 E. 2570 feet to a corner which is 125 feet S. 85 1/2 W. from the West margin of Oak Street extended to South City Line; thence S. 4 1/2 E. 158 feet with the East line of an alley; thence S. 19 E. 187 feet to a corner in the East line of the alley that runs through blocks 22, 23, 24, 25 and 26 in Washington Heights; thence N. 71 E. with the South line of Lot No. 2 in Block No. 35 and across said Oak Street 268 feet a piece of iron for corner in East margin of Oak Street; thence with the East line of Oak Street N. 19 W. 152 feet and N. 4 1/2 W. 127.3 feet to the original South boundary line of the City of Taylor; thence N. 85 1/2 E. to the West line of Main Street; thence N. 4 1/2 W. with the West line of Main Street to the S. E. corner of Lot No. 10 in Block No. 5, Washington's Heights Addition; thence N. 85 1/2 E. 100 feet to East line of Main Street; thence S. 4 1/2 E. with East line of Main Street to the original South line; thence N. 85 1/2 E. to the place of beginning.

Second: Said election shall be held at the City Hall in said City of Taylor, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of and to hold said election:

FRANK KING, Clerk.

Third: The City Clerk of said City is hereby directed to mail a copy of said proposed amendment to every qualified voter in said City of Taylor, Texas, as appears from the tax rolls of said City for the year ending January 31, 1925, not less than 30 days prior to the said date of said election.

Fourth: The form of the ballot to be used in said election shall be as follows:

### OFFICIAL BALLOT

Shall Section 2 of Article 1 of the now existing charter of the City of Taylor, Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

### Article 1.

E. corner of Lot No. 23 in the Alexander's Addition to the City of Taylor; thence N. 43 W. 147 feet; thence N. 85 1/2 E. 50 feet to corner; thence N. 43 W. 175 feet to the N. E. corner of said Alexander's Addition to the City of Taylor; thence S. 85 1/2 W. to the S. E. corner of a tract of ten acres subdivided by Thomas Duffy; thence N. 19 1/2 W. with the East line of said ten acres 1185.3 feet to the N. E. corner of said ten acres; thence S. 71 W. 46 feet to piece of iron pipe for corner; thence N. 19 W. at 40 feet pass the S. E. corner of Taylor City Cemetery at 2838 feet to corner on the South margin of a public road called Thorndale Street; thence S. 71 W. 246 feet to corner on the East right of way line of said Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railroad Company of Texas; thence in a Northerly direction with said right of way to the South margin of a public road on the South line of the John Pharrass Survey; thence S. 71 W. with the South margin of said road, passing the S. W. corner of said John Pharrass Survey and the S. E. corner of the W. J. Baker Survey and continuing S. 71 W. with the South margin of said road to the N. W. corner of what is now the Taylor City Park and also known as the Dan Murphy tract at the North end of Davis Street; thence N. 19 W. at 50 feet intersect the North margin of said road at 1290 feet, a stake for corner; thence S. 71 W. 868 feet to a stake for corner on the West line of said Walter Gilmore tract and the East line of a tract owned by Joe Stanny; thence S. 19 E. 181 feet to stake for corner; thence S. 71 W. 1342 feet across said Joe Stanny tract to corner on the East margin of a public road; thence N. 19 W. 847 feet to corner; thence S. 71 W. 50 feet to the N. W. corner of said City of Taylor; thence N. 85 1/2 E. 2570 feet to a corner which is 125 feet S. 85 1/2 W. from the West margin of Oak Street extended to South City Line; thence S. 4 1/2 E. 158 feet with the East line of an alley; thence S. 19 E. 187 feet to a corner in the East line of the alley that runs through blocks 22, 23, 24, 25 and 26 in Washington Heights; thence N. 71 E. with the South line of Lot No. 2 in Block No. 35 and across said Oak Street 268 feet a piece of iron for corner in the East margin of Oak Street; thence with the East line of Oak Street N. 19 W. 152 feet and N. 4 1/2 W. 127.3 feet to the original South boundary line of the City of Taylor; thence N. 85 1/2 E. to the West line of Main Street; thence N. 4 1/2 W. with the West line of Main Street to the S. E. corner of Lot No. 10 in Block No. 5, Washington's Heights Addition; thence N. 85 1/2 E. 100 feet to East line of Main Street; thence S. 4 1/2 E. with East line of Main Street to the original South line; thence N. 85 1/2 E. to the place of beginning.

Those voting at such election who desire to vote for the adoption of said amendment, shall do so by writing the word "Yes" after such proposed amendment; and those who desire to vote against the adoption of said amendment shall do so by writing the word "No" after such amendment.

Fifth: Notice of the holding of this election shall also be given by publication of this ordinance in each issue of the Taylor Daily Press, a newspaper published in the City of Taylor, Texas, for at least thirty days next preceding the date of such election.

Passed, examined and approved finally, this 27th day of October, A. D. 1925.



## Williamson County Relief Board

The new 1935 Taylor City Hall was built with some funds from the Williamson County Relief Board. This was the Civil Works Administration, a jobs program created under the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, introduced by President Franklin D.

Roosevelt as part of the New Deal during the Great Depression. The CWA had a presence everywhere in the US, but the program only lasted 2 years. This program paid for construction projects like roads, parks, schools and public buildings. Taylor was one such community that benefited from this program, with the labor and construction of the 1935 City Hall partly funded by this program.

The contract for that project was included in the 1935 Time Capsule, appropriately. The entire document was not scanned due to the fragile nature of the pages.




# Rosters and Directories

There was a lot of community involvement in Taylor, via organizations both social and specific. Many early citizens were very invested in the growth and health of their city. Most of these volunteer organizations raised funds for specific charitable causes as well as assisting the leadership of the city. In recognition of these groups of individuals, several lists of organization memberships or officers were included in the 1935 City Hall Time Capsule.

## Williamson County Directory, July 1934

By the 1930's telephones were more prevalent in both homes and businesses. The advertising section or yellow pages became important exposure for area businesses and industry. At the time of this countywide directory, the City of Taylor was the most populous.

City listings included Taylor, Georgetown, Granger, Coupland, Jarrell, Walburg, Weir, Liberty Hill, Thrall, Florence, Schwertner, Round Rock, Hutto, Leander, and Jonah.



## City of Taylor Employees

At the opening of the time capsule in October of 2014, the City of Taylor employed about 150 employees. In 1935, there were only 36 employees. Please note that it was common to note ethnicity of individuals—African Americans and sometimes Hispanic Americans were noted as “colored.” In the listing of city employees, those ethnic groups were labeled “col.”




## Taylor Chamber of Commerce

A chamber of commerce is common in thriving communities, and provides a network for area businesses and other related support. The Taylor Chamber of Commerce operated under a board of directors and had officers that ran the organization. Included in the time capsule was a listing of the Taylor Chamber of Commerce officials as well as the Ladies Auxiliary of the Chamber of Commerce. Both of these lists were typed on Taylor Chamber of Commerce letterhead.



## Taylor Rotary Club

The Rotary Club is an international organization which saw its birth in 1905 in Chicago. This service club aimed at business leaders and professionals had a local Taylor club. Again, some of the names in the Taylor Rotary Club reflect local leaders of the era.



## Veterans Organizations

There were several organizations that supported the soldiers who defended their country in war time. Many Taylor men had served in the Civil War, as part of the Confederate Army. Taylor veterans of 1935 included those who fought in the Spanish American War (1898), and World War I.

The American Legion was a more encompassing organization dedicated to all U.S. war veterans and was formed in Paris, in 1919 on the heels of World War I. The Taylor Post of the American Legion was named after Graham D. Luhn, a Taylor service man who served as lieutenant in the 36<sup>th</sup> Lone Star division in World War I, perishing in the Meuse-Argonne Offensive, France.



The enclosed list of officers and members is on official stationery of the Graham D. Luhn Post of the American Legion. The list is handwritten, making some names a little harder to decipher.

At the beginning of the letter is the following inscription:

## Roster of Taylor Volunteer Fire Department

Included in the time capsule was a roster of Taylor fire fighters from 1935 and 1905. The 1935 list of men is nicely typed and consists of two pages and an envelope. The 1905 roster is handwritten on lined notebook paper and is in very, very poor condition. The ink has faded and folds in the paper have crumbled.

In many early communities, the fire department did indeed consist of volunteers. These volunteers had other jobs and occupations, but were called upon to assist with the full time fire fighters employed by the city. The City of Taylor had two major fires in its history—a small fire in May of 1878 which burned down a few downtown businesses, and a major fire on February 25, 1879, which consumed almost all of the downtown district.
